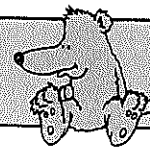


Apostrophes for Possession



You can use apostrophes to show that someone or something owns something.

For singular nouns, and plural nouns that don't end in 's', → the drum's beat the bus's driver
add an apostrophe and 's'. the mice's hole

If a plural noun ends in 's', you only add the apostrophe. → the daisies' petals
